They are joined by 7th graders Kassie Loutzenhiser and Maddie May, along with newcomers Kambrie Loutzenhiser and Callie Woodral from 6th grade. The girls were determined to go undefeated this season and win the MAC conference tournament. Well, they accomplished both of these goals. The girls had an undefeated season, with 10-0 as their record. The team says their main highlight of the season was the Garden County game be-



cause they overcame the adversity of being up at half-time and continuing to play their game. Coach Avila summarized the girls' improvements: playing better as a team, improving their ball handling immensely, and having a better ability to run the floor, as well as their attitudes towards the game. Avila still thinks, "We have yet to play our best game, but when we do, watch out!" This leads to high hopes for the coming seasons and seeing the girls continue to improve, especially with the 8th graders moving up to high school basketball next year.

The Junior High Boys are back this season under the guidance of a new coach, Ray Lemoine. Lemoine was most excited about seeing what the boys were capable of. His highlight from the season was the Scottsbluff game when the team was working together on offense and defense. Even though the boys didn't have a winning record, they still showed much improvement this season. The boys came together to work as a team, which is a foundation for a stronger team for the coming year.

As the season came to an end, Coach Avila and Coach Lemoine were proud of the massive amounts of improvement from their teams. As the eighth graders move on to high school basketball next year, we will welcome the incoming 6th and 7th graders to the teams.

New Year - New FFA Competitions by Adam Knaub

There have been two FFA district competitions since the start of the new year. These two competitions have been very good for the FFA Chapter, with teams taking home top spots at these events. This year's teams have done the best they have ever done at these competitions compared to the last couple of years. On the 10th of January, there was the District CDE at Scottsbluff, which included Welding, Livestock Management, and Ag Sales. The second one in January was on the 31st, including Ag Mechanics, Food Science, Vet Science, and Farm and Ranch Management.

The Welding team included Nathan Clement, Adam Knaub, Wyatt Reichenberg, and Blake Ysac. This team did very well. Blake placed 2nd in the Gas Metal Arc Welding sector, Wyatt placed 2nd in the Shielded Metal Arc Welding sector, Nathan placed 2nd in the Oxy Acetylene Welding sector, and Adam placed 5th in the Gas Tungsten Arc Welding sector with the team as a whole placing 1st. The welding event involved a hands-on welding test and a written exam. The welding portion required contestants to weld metal according to the build plan they were given, and then they were judged on the finished product. The written exam counts for fewer points but is also important because it assesses their welding knowledge. Each section can have its own winner depending on how well the contestant performs and their test results.

The Livestock Management team placed 1st in the Dairy and Swine divisions. This team of five included Micah Dittbenner, Kambree Hottell, Logan Mason, Isaac Olsen, and Andie West. There were six categories of exams: beef cattle, dairy cattle, swine, poultry, sheep, and horses. Each portion assessed a different aspect of the designated animal, such as quality assurance, breed identification, associated diseases, and anatomy. The beef portion included a feed ration balance test, while the dairy included reading milk receipts and identifying different kinds of cheeses. As for the poultry, tests included identifying various parts of the egg and the chicken. Additionally, each team member took two tests about poultry and agriculture. The Ag Sales team, comprised of Ti Gaash, Nate McGowan, Brendyn Onstott, and Jacob Parsons, was also a part of this competition. This was a learning opportunity for the team as they didn't have prior experience with this event. Although they didn't place, they performed well.

In the second competition of the year, the Ag Mechanics team placed 2nd. This team included Nathan, Adam, Brentsen McGowan, and Wyatt. In this event, the contestants have specific areas that they specialize in for the competition, which include hydraulics, small engines, electrical systems, and machinery. The competition consists of a hands-on task in which the individuals work on an assignment they are given by the judges, like wiring up an outlet, timing a small engine, finding specific parts on a piece of machinery, or tak-

ing a hydraulic cylinder out and finding the area of the cylinder. Once they have completed the task, they switch to an identification exam where they must identify symbols or different parts of the system. This team qualified for the State Competition based on their hard work on this exam. **Continued on page 3.**

These students were a part of the Food Science, Vet Science, and Farm and Ranch Management teams. Some of these teams, such as the Food Science and Farm and Ranch Management teams, were missing the required number of team members to qualify for state. However, these were still learning opportunities for the individuals participating in each event. As for the Vet Science team, Kambree walked away with a ribbon for her test portion.

According to Mr. Gifford, "I see a lot more will-ingness to step up and take a leadership role in the chapter and the school. The members have done a good job expanding their experiences by trying new competitions and getting others to do so as well." The FFA chapter has one more district competition in Kimball before state. The FFA members have done a great job this year by competing at a high level and trying new things and different competitions!

Dear families and patrons of Banner County School,

It is my pleasure to share this Annual Report and mid-year reflection on our school community! The school year has been busy with a very full roster of activities and sports. Our reading incentive program, AR Road, continues to get students from Kindergarten to High School into books and set personal reading goals. Monthly school-wide assemblies have recognized students nominated for "Student of the Month" and "Shout Outs!" to elementary students caught doing random acts of kindness. The Jobs for American Graduates (JAG) program, first in the Panhandle, aims to develop leadership and job readiness skills among middle and high school students.

We continue to work towards aligning academic programs across grades levels and publishing the curriculum for each subject. Our web-site, which is still undergoing some fine-tuning, will ultimately house the curriculum. My goal is to have all curricula and course information accessible on the web-site by the end of the summer.

Across Nebraska, the importance of Career and Technical Education (CTE) is central to many conversations about school-based opportunities and preparation for life beyond high school. While funding for program components such as materials and supplies is important (BCS received about \$14,000 in CTE funding this year), having talented teachers, industry partners, and flexible scheduling are the keys to giving our students options and opportunities to explore a variety of career paths. We hope to expand the choices for entry level certifications through our partnership with Western Nebraska Community College (WNCC) for our students. Two of our programs, FFA and HEC, continue to provide real-world experiences for students. FFA students completed the construction of a greenhouse this year and High Energy Cappuccino has extended their morning coffee service at the walk-up window to Mondays, Wednesday, and Fridays.

For the 6th year in a row, we have managed to reduce the property tax levy while improving programs and embarking on a major facilities upgrade. Our partnership with AMERESCO takes advantage of 1% financing that will save energy dollars, improve the aesthetic appearance of our classrooms and halls, and keep the snow melt from seeping into classrooms! We look forward to the project's completion by the end of the summer.

This year, we welcomed ten new staff members! While staffing continues to be a challenge across the state and teacher recruitment and retention a topic of many school administrator conversations, we are fully staffed from the principal's office to PK! Learning new roles and responsibilities, developing academic and activity schedules, and supporting each other amidst all of the change are testimony to the dedication of our staff to our students and our school. BCS is a wonderful place to learn, work, and play!

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

Student Academic Growth—K-8

Nebraska Dept. of Education uses NSCAS Growth, an adaptive, assessment of English language arts (ELA) and mathematics in grades 3-8 and Science in grades 5 & 8. NSCAS Growth assesses the progression and growth of students based on the year end standards for their grade level, reported as Developing, On Track, and Advanced.

NSCAS results are reported as averages, which gives us a bird's eye view of student growth, but do not represent the individual student growth achieved in our small classes. When we look at the data, we see students who have met or exceeded expectations, and despite reports of learning loss due to COVID from many parts of the country, most of our students' learning is "On Track."

Assessment data help us support students by making adjustments to instruction, program materials, and allocation of teaching and support staff. Our data indicate BCS students are headed in the right directionexceeding the State proficiency averages in both Math and Science.





TRANSPORTATION

BCS operates 8 bus routes with door-to-school service in the county and stops in Gering and Kimball. The annual pupil transportation budget of \$185,900 supports both route and activity trips for students. At the midyear point, our drivers have travelled 87,284 miles safely. We have 5 staff members with CDLs, 5 staff members certified to drive a small bus, and 3 substitute bus drivers with CDLs. All staff members who drive small vehicles for activities complete the trainings required in Nebraska. Finding qualified bus drivers, for both regular routes and as substitutes, continues to be a challenge! The district is an approved FMSCA training site and Tod Wenger, our Driver Education instructor, can certify drivers in the ELDT on-site. We will also reimburses all costs associated with obtaining a CDL to potential drivers with signed contracts.


